PURPOSE

Annually, the Town of Carrboro conducts a public auction to sell surplus property. Prior to disposing of the items, NC General Statute 160A-270 requires that the Board approve a resolution to declare the property as surplus and authorize the sale of these items.

SUMMARY

Public auctions are recommended to dispose of most surplus personal property in the Town's possession and unclaimed items in the custody of the Police Department. Selling the items generates additional revenue for the Town in addition to alleviating space concerns. Items at the auction for which there are no bidders or where bid amounts do not meet appropriate minimum amounts will be sold by sealed bid or negotiated sale with approval of the Town Manager at a later date as permitted by General Statute.

Included among the items scheduled for auction are 38 bicycles and other unclaimed items in custody of the Police Department. Net proceeds generated from the sale of these items are forwarded to the schools in accordance with NC General Statute 15-15.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this item is for the Board of Aldermen to consider amending the Town Code to prohibit riding lawn mowers on sidewalks.

SUMMARY

The Carrboro Police Department has requested that the Town Code be amended to prohibit riding lawn mowers as traveling devices along sidewalks.

The town attorney reviewed the issue and has drafted the proposed ordinance amendment.

ANALYSIS

The town attorney believes that a riding lawn mower falls within the definition of "vehicle" and "motor vehicle" as addressed under Sections 6-1(11) and 6-1 (20). The attorney also notes that Section 6-36 prohibits motor vehicles on bikeways, but finds no comparable ban with respect to sidewalks.

The town attorney recommends that Section 6-38 of the Town Code be amended by changing the title to "Bicycles and Motor Vehicles Prohibited on Certain Sidewalks", making subsection (1) subsection (a), and adding a new subsection (b) to read as follows:

(b) "No person may operate a motor vehicle (including without limitation any riding lawn mower or other motorized device designed to carry one or more persons) upon any sidewalk".

PURPOSE:

Funds are made available annually through the NC Community Assistance Program to address community needs for low income families and individuals. This year the maximum amount of funds available per jurisdiction for a scattered site project is \$350,000.00. These funds are available through a competitive grant process which requires citizen participation. The citizen participation process requires two (2) public hearings. The purpose of this item is to receive public comment on the actual application that has been prepared to be submitted to the state for consideration for funding.

ANALYSIS:

The application process requires that two public hearings be held to receive public input on the application. The first hearing was held on August 25, 1998 to receive input for the public on the type of application to be submitted and possible site for the project. At that hearing the board of Aldermen asked that the staff solicit additional input from the public on this matter. Staff prepared a press release and submitted it to all of the local news media. The press release was also posted on the town bulletin boards. In addition to the press release Empowerment Inc. was contacted for input, units that might qualify for this scattered site application.

This public hearing is to receive public comment on the completed application. This application was compiled from information maintained by the Community Developments Director's office and obtained from the survey of substandard housing in Carrboro, data maintained by the Home Council and from names submitted by citizens and Empowerment Inc. Each unit was evaluated for severity of structural conditions and included in the application accordingly. The poorer the condition of the units included in the application, the better the chance of having the application funded by the state. Units suggested that did not meet this need were referred to other programs such as Orange Community Housings Senior citizen Emergency Repair Program or JOCCA.

ACTION REQUESTED

It is requested that the Board of Aldermen approve the application as submitted and authorize the staff to submit the application to the state for funding. While there is no required match for the grant, it is requested that the town show commitment to the project by providing \$25,000 toward the project. This funding would be requested in the FY 1999-2000 budget.

ADMINISTRATION'S RECOMMENDATION:

The Administration recommends approval of the application by the Board and that the Mayor be authorized to execute all necessary documents for submittal.

PRESS RELEASE

The Town of Carrboro is now accepting citizen comments to be included in an application for Community Development Block Grant funds. The 1998-99 application will be a scattered site application. In addition, the Town is accepting applications from individuals interested in serving on the Community Development Block Grant Project Area Committee.

Comments on the completed application may be submitted to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen at a public hearing on September 22, 1998 at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall Board Room. Prior to the September 22, 1998 Meeting comments may be submitted to the Economic and Community Development Director at Carrboro Town Hall 968-7700. All citizens are encouraged to submit the addresses of units that may can be evaluated for consideration in the application.

The attached resolutions are offered for your consideration as we continue our 'trash talking'. They are adapted from texts sent by Lou Zeller of the Blue Ridge Environmental Defense League and are being considered by many communities around the country. I believe they have already been reviewed, and perhaps adopted, by Orange County and the Landfill Owners Group.

The first on "Zero Waste" makes a statement of an important goal, however difficult it may be to reach. Setting a goal of zero waste will help guide us even though it may be many years, if ever, that we are able to achieve it.

The second on "Producer Responsibility" is also a statement of principle. It is offered with the objective that, together with similar resolutions from other jurisdictions around the state and nation, it will apply enough pressure to make a difference on decisions made producers far from Carrboro.

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE CREATION OF A ZERO WASTE PLAN

Resolution No. 11/98-99

Whereas, the placement of materials in waste disposal facilities, such as landfills and incinerators, causes damage to human health, wastes natural resources and wrongly transfers liabilities to future generations; and,

Whereas, the elimination of specified types of waste for disposal, also known as disposal bans, will protect states from waste importation from other states and nations; and,

Whereas, consumers are currently forced to assume the high financial cost of collecting, recycling, and disposing of materials; and,

Whereas, tax subsidies for waste and virgin materials send the wrong economic signals to both consumers and producers; and,

Whereas, a resource recovery-based economy will create and sustain more productive and meaningful jobs; and,

Whereas, increasingly, U.S. and international governments and organizations are adopting the policy that the financial responsibility of collecting, recycling, and disposing of materials belongs with producers; and,

Whereas, producers should design products to ensure that they can be safely recycled back into the marketplace or nature; and,

Whereas, most types of waste streams can be eliminated through across-the-board minimum recycling content laws, the use of non-toxic alternatives in product design, and local composting facilities; and,

Whereas, recognizing that some presently non-recyclable materials are necessary for public health and national security, in which case, retrievable storage is the only safe alternative; and,

Whereas, recognizing that voluntary recycling goals have not, and in all probability cannot, achieve waste elimination; and,

Whereas, with the understanding that government is ultimately responsible for leading by example and establishing criteria needed to eliminate waste, so that

manufacturers produce and businesses sell materials that can be safely recycled or composted.

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen supports the creation of a Zero Waste Plan in order to eliminate waste and pollution in the manufacture, use, storage, and recycling of materials.

A RESOLUTION RELATING TO MANAGEMENT OF WASTE FROM MANUFACTURED PRODUCTS AND PACKAGING Resolution No. 10/98-99

Whereas, approximately 7500 tons of waste will be landfilled by the Town of Carrboro during the current fiscal year (1998-99); and,

Whereas, the cost to the taxpayers of the Town of Carrboro for collecting and landfilling those wastes is estimated at \$773,000; and,

Whereas, the United States Environmental Protection Agency estimates that over 70 percent of these wastes are manufactured products, including 'durable' goods (appliances, furniture, and tires), 'nondurable' goods (newspapers, magazines, office paper, junk mail, diapers, and household items) and packaging (cans, bottles, cartons, bags and wraps); and,

Whereas, decisions about manufacture of these products are made by producers with little regard for the need for waste prevention and recycling; and,

Whereas, the responsibility for managing these discarded products falls entirely on the citizens of our community; and,

Whereas, the continued wasting of these products through landfilling or incineration results in the depletion of our natural resources and the pollution of our environment, now and for the indefinite future; and,

Whereas, waste prevention, reuse, recycling and composting are materials management options that conserve these resources while reducing the environmental impacts which accrue from extracting these resources from the environment; and,

Whereas, the success of waste prevention, reuse, recycling and composting programs depends upon efforts by producers to take responsibility for minimizing waste and utilizing recovered resources;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CARRBORO BOARD OF ALDERMEN RESOLVES:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen considers the responsibility to manage waste from manufactured products and packaging represents an "unfunded mandate" on its citizens.

Section 2. Producers should share the responsibility for eliminating this waste-through eliminating excess packaging, designing products for durability, reusability and recyclability; using recycled materials; and providing financial support for collection, processing, recycling and disposal of used materials.

Section 3. The N.C. General Assembly and U.S. Congress should adopt legislation to shift the burden of managing discarded products and packaging from local governments to the producers of those products and requests our delegations to sponsor such legislation.

Section 4. This change in policy should be undertaken as part of a broad effort to eliminate waste by consumers, government, and business.

SUBJECT: Discussion of Proposed Sites for a Senior Center

PURPOSE

The Town Manager has been participating in a planning committee on Aging Resources. Orange County has requested that this committee make a recommendation concerning a site for a senior center in southern Orange County. The purpose of this agenda item is to receive input from the Mayor and Board of Alderman concerning the proposed sites.

ANALYSIS

Enclosed is a revised list for a new Southern Orange Senior Center. Pros and cons are listed for each of the proposed sites. None of the sites are very convenient for Carrboro senior citizens. The largest concentration of senior citizens in Orange County is along the 15-501 corridor going through Chapel Hill and several of the sites proposed are in this area. The Town Manager has been advocating the Southern Human Services Center tract in conjunction with adjoining UNC property since this site is centrally located in southern Orange County. This site obviously has draw backs at this time from a public transit view point.

RECOMMENDATION

Since none of the sites are more accessible than the other for Carrboro users, it is recommended that a site be selected where the County and the University can construct a joint facility. Such a facility should better serve the senior citizens of southern Orange County. It is further recommended that the County look at additional public transit services that is convenient for senior citizens to use which ever site is selected.

ACTION REQUESTED

The Town Manager is requesting direction from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen as to which sites it would prefer for the Senior Center.






ASSUMPTIONS:

- * An ideal Senior Center would:
 - be accessible to those it is serving (centrally located, near major roads, on public transit routes);
 - be in a visible location; have adequate parking; be handicapped accessible; be free-standing.
- * For a new Senior Center, at least 15,000 square feet of space is desired; 20,000 square feet is preferred. However, current funding may only provide for about 12,000 square feet to be built initially. Parking for 80 to 100 cars is desired. This could be accomplished on a site of 3 to 5 acres. As a "campus" environment with Senior Services and a Gerontology Center, comprised of more than one building is desired, a larger parcel will likely be needed.
- * Joining with UNC's Institute on Aging and possibly with UNC Hospitals would require significantly more space (40,000 to 60,000 square feet or more, overall)
- * Site should be in the Chapel Hill and Carrboro area; possibly would serve both communities.
- * Either existing buildings or a new building project can be considered. Ownership of the property is strongly preferred over leasing.
- * According to Chapel Hill Planning Dept., a Senior Center will likely be classified as a "Public Use Facility", which is allowed in virtually all zoning categories. In some zones, especially low-density residential zones, the Floor Area Ratio (FAR) limits may affect the ability to build a large structure; Town Council could modify those restrictions.

Dear Michael:

On Tuesday, August 18, the Orange County Board of Commissioners received the Joint Summary Report and Preliminary Recommendations of the Collaborative Planning Committee for a Southern Orange County Senior Center (Chapel Hill Senior Center). This committee deserves recognition and appreciation for the assemblage of ideas and recommendations for a future Senior Citizen Resource Center in Southern Orange County. Of particular interest to the Board of Commissioners were the recommendations on the top three potential sites for such a center. The Board of Commissioners concurs in the strategic importance of confirming a site as quickly as possible. During the Commissioners' discussion, there were several points that I will summarize below:

1. The timetable for siting and building a Senior Center is critical. The Commissioners discussed the functional timetable necessary to assure a continuous presence of a Senior Citizen Center within the Chapel Hill area, regardless of the final site chosen. A siting decision by October 1998 is necessary because the Board of Commissioners intends to seek authority from the North Carolina Local Government Commission (LGC) to borrow money before the end of 1998 to finance the construction of the replacement for the Chapel Hill Senior Center, as well as improvements to the Whitted and Northern Human Services Centers. The County's 10 year Capital Investment Plan (CIP) includes the plan to seek a "private placement" (a negotiated bank loan) of approximately \$4.6 million to finance these three projects. They will be pursued as one package for administrative ease and to reduce staff time, legal costs, and debt issuance costs.

The County cannot borrow this amount of money without permission from the LGC. We believe our chances of securing that approval will be significantly enhanced if we

can provide the LGC with specific plans about the Senior Center replacement, particularly its planned location. The Board of Commissioners will have to submit a formal application by late October in order to meet the timetable that would allow the LGC to render a decision at their December 1998 meeting. If the County can close on the financing deal by the end of the calendar year, it can secure interest rates that are 1-2% lower than we would pay thereafter. That is because any calendar year in which the County incurs less than \$10 million in debt keeps us "bank qualified" as a small issuer under IRS regulations. The financial institution which loans the money to a "bank qualified" borrower can treat the interest it earns on the loan as non-taxable. Since the bank is not paying federal taxes on the interest we pay them, they can offer us a lower interest rate.

2. Orange County will remain bank qualified for 1998, but in early 1999, the County will begin selling bonds approved by voters in the November 1997 referenda. For the next few years, the County will almost certainly not be "bank qualified" because we will be selling \$56 million worth of bonds over a multi-year period.

Any private placement funds that the County draws down but does not spend immediately would be placed in interest earning accounts. The rate that the County earns on its investments at this time is very close to the interest rate that the County would likely have to pay on any money borrowed.

3. Assuming that the importance of building a new center that is ready for occupancy by July 1, 2001 is the priority, the decision on a site will need to be made by late October as mentioned earlier.

While noting the Homestead location as one of the three priority sites, the Commissioners discussed some constraints as to its use, which included the fact that the Homestead site is the only sizable parcel of county property located in Southern Orange County that can be used for future county facilities, such as additional human services functions and court facilities.

While the Commissioners did not reach any final conclusion as to the possible use of county property at Homestead for a Senior Center site, they did ask the Collaborative Planning Committee, and particularly representatives from UNC-CH and the Town of Chapel Hill, to focus intently on the viability of sites owned by the Town and University.

4. The Commissioners agreed to consider this matter again at the regular Board meeting on September 15. Hopefully, within the next three weeks progress can be made collectively by the Collaborative Committee and by individual jurisdictions, including the University and the Town of Chapel Hill, in addressing the realistic use of publicly owned property for the Senior Center besides the county-owned property at Homestead.

Finally, please be assured that Orange County continues to be a strong supporter of a new Senior Center facility as demonstrated by our commitment of \$1.8 million towards its construction. We are confident that our partners from the Friends of the Senior Center, the University and the Town of Chapel Hill are equally committed and that a new facility at a new location will be a reality by July 1, 2001. We look forward to our working together.
