PURPOSE:

The purpose of this item is to present to the Board of Aldermen the recommendations from the Human Services Commission for funding requests from non-profit agencies providing services to Carrboro citizens.

INFORMATION:

The Commission held joint meetings with the Chapel Hill Human Services Committee for those agencies that requested funds from Carrboro and Chapel Hill. Separate hearings were held for those agencies that requested funds from Carrboro only. The hearing process took eight weeks with the commission seeing six to seven applicants a week on average. The Human Services Committee is staffed by a diverse group of volunteers with strong human services backgrounds. 50 agencies applied for funds from the Human Services budget. Fifty-one agencies had an opportunity to present their request and respond to questions from the committee. Two agencies receive funding based upon formal agreements between the local governments. The total recommended allocation for fiscal year 2010-11 is \$ 144,296. This amount includes an extra allocation of \$10,000.00 above the annual allocation that is tied to the consumer price index. The total amounted requested from the agencies is \$250,801. The Human Services committee saw a continued decline in the amount of funds available to agencies trying to meet human services needs through grant opportunities and personal giving. As the population grows older, there is a greater need for families to provide care for aging parents and relatives, the provision of basic needs such as food, shelter, respite care for families with sick or mentally challenged children, assistance with care for the growing population with HIV and AIDS, and the development of work opportunities for the growing disabled population, and homeless. The Latino population continues to grow and so do the special needs for the population. The United Way has had a decline in donations for the last five years, which directly impacts our local service provider's ability to provide much needed services to our citizens. The agencies are looking for additional funds to make up the loss of personal donations, in addition to looking at ways to stream line their agencies without cutting services.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The cost of funding the recommendations of the Human Services Commission recommendations will be \$144,296.00.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The staff supports the proposed allocations as proposed by the Human Services Committee and has set aside \$144,296.00 to cover the allocations.
