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# ORDINANCE PROHIBITING CONSUMPTION OF MALT BEVERAGES OR UNFORTIFIED WINE ON PUBLIC PROPERTY AND POSSESSION OF OPEN CONTAINERS OF MALT BEVERAGES OR UNFORTIFIED WINES ON PUBLIC PROPERTY

Chief Callahan stated that the 1995 General Assembly authorized local governments to regulate or prohibit the possession of open containers of malt beverages and unfortified wine on public property. The Police Department requests that the Board of Aldermen consider adopting an ordinance which would prohibit the possession of open containers of malt beverages and unfortified wines by pedestrians on public property.

Chief Callahan stated that the Town of Chapel Hill adopted had adopted an ordinance expanding its regulations of possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages. Since that time Carrboro has experienced an increased incidence of possession of open containers of malt beverages and unfortified wine on public property and concurrently, an increase in related problems such as loitering, consumption of malt beverages and unfortified wine, panhandling, and disturbances. In addition, the town has had two recent inquiries from persons who are considering opening nightclubs in the downtown area. Based upon these factors, it is anticipated that pedestrian traffic will continue to increase in the downtown area and that the problems associated with alcohol consumption will also increase. In an effort to be proactive and able to effectively deal with problems associated with the consumption of alcohol on public property, the Police Department requests that the Board adopt an ordinance amending the Town Code to include the prohibition of possession of open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property.

Calvin Cunningham, President of UNC Student Body, requested that the Board hold a public hearing on this matter prior to taking any action.

Steve Wallace requested that the Board hold a public hearing on this matter.
