PUBLIC HEARING/LAND USE ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENT TO REVISE APPENDIX I

References to stormwater management are currently found in Section 15-263 and Appendix I of the Land Use Ordinance. Staff has determined that a revision to Appendix I is necessary in order for stormwater management requirements to be consistent. A draft ordinance has been prepared. A public hearing must be held to receive public comment prior to any action. The Administration recommended that the Board of Alderman adopt the revised ordinance, with additional clarifying language proposed by staff.

A REVIEW OF DRAFT MOU FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

A committee composed of representatives from the Town of Carrboro, the Town of Chapel Hill, and The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill has been meeting since spring 2002 to prepare a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for Public Transportation Services. A draft MOU has been prepared. A resolution authorizing the Town Manager to sign the MOU was presented.

Dale McKeel, the town's Transportation Planner, made the presentation.

Aldermen Zaffron and Gist commended Alderman McDuffee for her work on the MOU.

Flo Miller, Chapel Hill Assistant Town Manager, spoke about the Transportation Advisory Board recommendation.

The PTC [Public Transit Committee] will receive updates and recommendations from the staff work group on general transit services, service levels, fares and budget, and services for the disabled, information systems for the transit system, and new environmentally friendly technologies.

A REQUEST TO ADOPT AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TOWN CODE TO PROHIBIT LOITERING IN THE TOWN COMMONS, CENTURY CENTER, TOWN PARKING LOTS AND BUS SHELTERS

Police and Chapel Hill Transit personnel have noticed increased loitering in town bus stop shelters since the advent of fare-free bus service. Generally, persons loitering have no specific intention to ride the bus. Chapel Hill Transit personnel and citizens who legitimately use the bus shelters while waiting for the bus have asked Police Officers to remove loiterers from the bus shelters. Currently, we have no specific authority to prohibit loitering at town bus stop shelters. This proposed Ordinance amends the current Ordinance simply by adding the Century Center, Town Commons, town-owned or leased parking lots, and town bus stop shelters to the list of other Town of Carrboro property upon which loitering is prohibited (including the Town Hall, Police or Fire station, and Public Works building).

Captain Daryl Caldwell of the Carrboro Police Department gave an overview of the problems that make the proposed ordinance necessary.

Mary Lou Kuschatka, Director of Chapel Hill Transit, spoke of several bus shelter complaints.

Alderman Herrera translated for two Latino women who have experienced problems with people loitering and panhandling at the bus shelters and at The Pantry.

Police Chief Carolyn Hutchison answered questions from members of the Board of Aldermen.

The program, now based in Chapel Hill, is seeking proposals for community partnerships that will develop and implement innovative programs that will achieve its goals. A draft proposal has been prepared and was presented for the Board's review. A resolution authorizing staff to proceed with the submittal of the proposal has been prepared and was recommended for the Board's adoption.

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrboro has an extensive history of providing a variety of means for citizens to choose active modes of transportation and recreation; and

WHEREAS, town staff have identified a number of community partners who embrace this opportunity to focus our efforts to increase opportunities for Carrboro citizens to be active and healthier as a result of physical activity.
